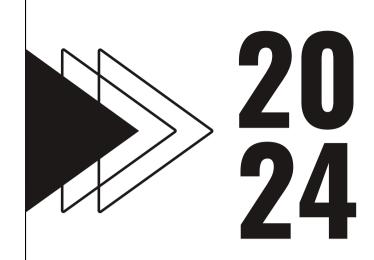

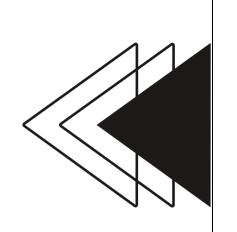

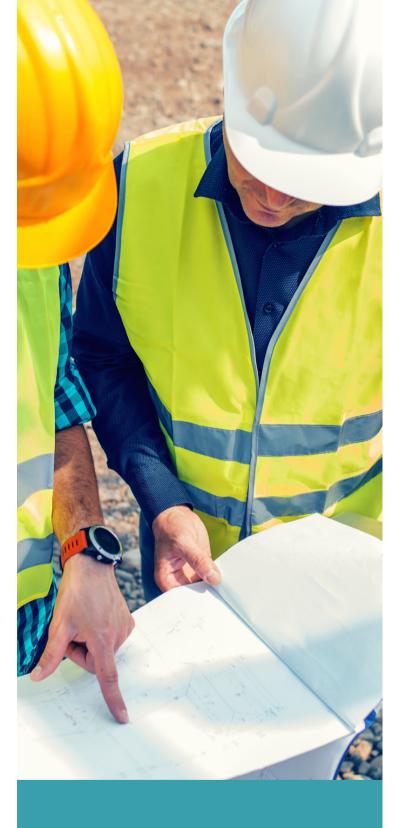

# INTRODUCTION

The Acadiana Metropolitan Planning
Organization (AMPO) is housed under the
Acadiana Planning Commission (APC) and is the
regional planning body for the Acadiana area.
MPOs are designated for census defined
urbanized areas with a population greater than
50K. MPOs that have a population greater than
200,000 residents are designated as a
Transportation Management Areas (TMA).
MPOs are tasked with certain core functions
related to transportation planning as per the
Code of Federal Regulations via the federal
reauthorization of transportation funding
through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs
Act.

MPOs are required to maintain a Long-Range Transportation Plan with a 20-year horizon, a Congestion Management Process (CMP) and a Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), a 4-year short term allocation of federal, state, and local transportation funding. The allocation of transportation funding is based off a formula derived from the MPO area's population. This funding, along with all federal transportation funding allocated in the Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA), should be expended on projects and endeavors that support the AMPO's goals and objectives as laid out by the Metropolitan Transportation Plan.



# PURPOSE OF THE ANNUAL LIST OF OBLIGATED PROJECTS

The annual list of obligated projects provides public information regarding the obligation of federal transportation funds in the Metropolitan Planning Area. The Code of Federal Regulations states the following:

## §450.334 Annual listing of obligated projects.

(a)In metropolitan planning areas, on an annual basis, no later than 90 calendar days following the end of the program year, the State, public transportation operator(s), and the MPO shall cooperatively develop a listing of projects (including investments in pedestrian walkways and bicycle transportation facilities) for which funds under 23 U.S.C. or 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53 were obligated in the preceding program year.

Through cooperation with the DOTD, FHWA, and the Lafayette Transit System (LTS), a list of projects is derived annually which shows the types of Federal funds that have been obligated throughout the MPA for the previous Federal Fiscal Year (October 1st thru September 30th). This list details information such as project names, amount of funding spent, date on which the funding was spent, and other relevant information for the public and decision makers on transportation transactions in the MPA. Transit funding lists are derived from funding approved for expenditure in the previous fiscal year.

# **DIVISION OF PROJECT TABLES**

The MPO's funding that is directly controlled by the Policy Board is the STP>200k (a suballocation from DOTD of FHWA's Surface Transportation Block Grant program).

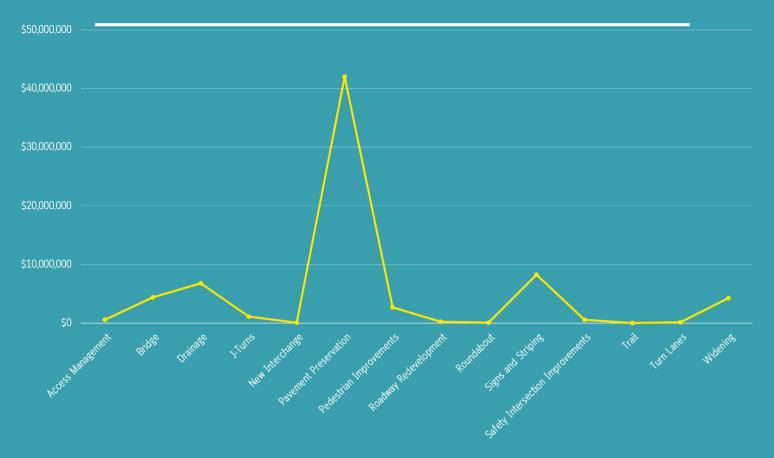

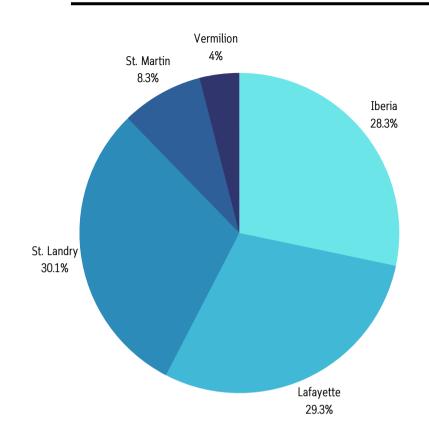
# FUNDING BY PROJECT TYPE



# **EQUITY ANALYSIS AND SUMMARY**

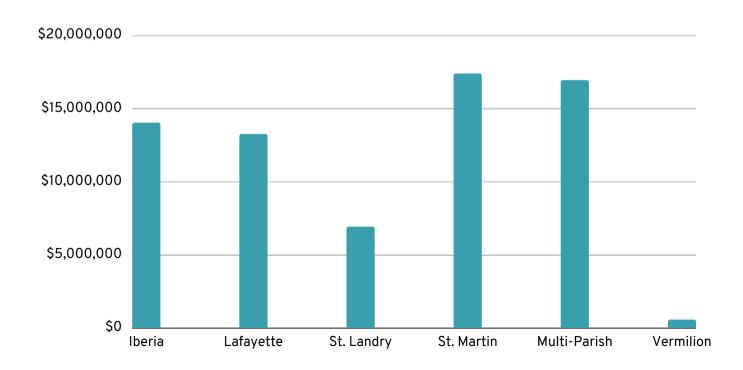
The MPO staff used geospatial analysis tools to review the federal investments in Acadiana to gauge if DOTD and the MPO are reaching the federal goal of 40% investments in disadvantaged areas. Of the federal funds expended in 2023, 94% were in or on the boundary in Census Tract that is designated as US DOT Transportation Disadvantaged Community .Of the Acadiana MPO's funding that is directly controlled by the Policy Board (STP>200K), 99% of funds were expended in a designated Disadvantaged Community Census Tract.

Overall federal funds expended in the AMPO region in FY 2023 totaled \$69,041,174, down from \$148,532,031 in FY 2022 but similar to 2021's \$67,927,838 federal funding. However, the total of all funds, including state cash, totaled \$168,095,836, closer to FY 2022's \$180,778,805 total of all funds.



# FUNDING BY PARISH -MPO ONLY FUNDING

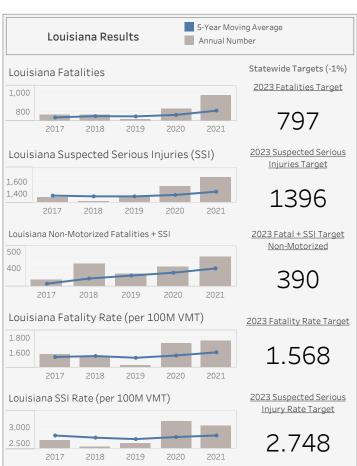
## FUNDING BY PARISH - ALL FEDERAL FUNDING

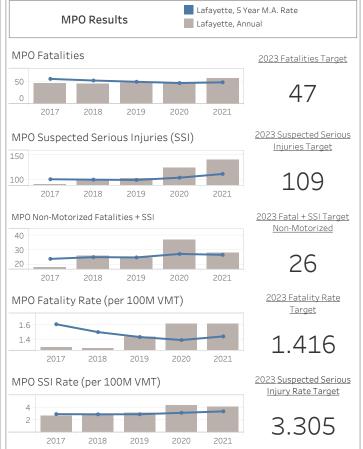

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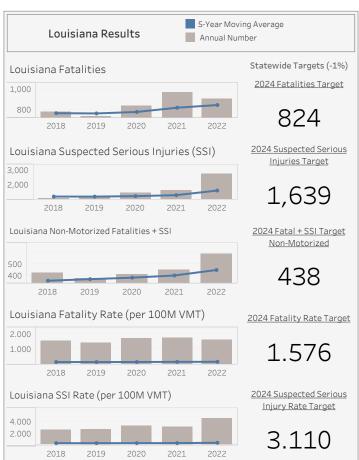

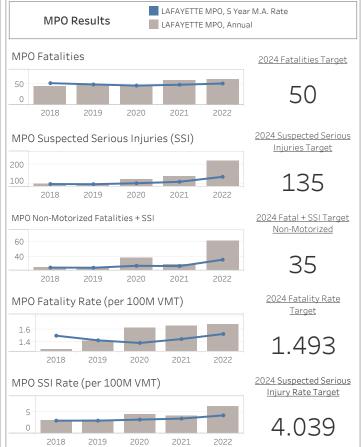

## **Performance and Expenditure Report**

## **Summary**

The Acadiana Metropolitan Planning Organization entered its tenth year as a Transportation Management Area (TMA) during the reporting period. Integration and implementation of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (Infrastructure and Investment Jobs Act of 2021) and compliance with 23 CFR 450(c) was the primary goal of the planning work program. A secondary goal was to integrate the MPO transportation plans, policies and guidelines into the federal and local planning process, as well as project delivery and regional technical planning assistance for members entities. The MPO expended 100% of the PL funds allocated for the federal fiscal year of 2023 and made one work program revision to include the purchase of software for agency functions and to adjust funds by task.

## PL-1 CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND PUBLIC OUTREACH:

### **Established Goals:**

The purpose of this task is to encompass and satisfy all public facilitation and requirements, implement public outreach, complete all work with the MPO committees. The Federal requirements are satisfied through the Public Participation Plan, Title VI Plan and ADA. The MPO will also implement ADA policies through this task. A large part of the MPO's work is completed through public outreach via media communications, public meetings, and social media advertisements.

## Actual Performance from 2023:

The MPO worked to provide public information on MPO Committee activities and transportation objectives. Highlights include the development of a new website for the MPO that was launched in February of 2023. Staff was able to double the weekly dedicated "Traffic Talk" segment on KADN from one spot to two spots, allowing for more time to educate the public on MPO plans, projects, and programs. The Transportation Technical Committee and the Transportation Policy Committee adopted meeting schedules to hold meetings July 2022, September 2022, January 2023, March 2023, and May 2023. All the scheduled meetings were held, with the exception of the September 2022 meetings for both committees due to lack of committee action for that time period.

Other highlights include the development and delivery of a presentation for FHWA's Every Day Count's Crowdsourcing Data webinar series and attendance at the EDC 6 peer exchange in Arizona. The ArcGIS Storymap program was utilized to create a comprehensive and accessible report for the ALOP. Staff presented on the MPO's use of VPI tools at the Louisiana Transportation Conference. The MPO partnered with DOTD to put on a Work Zone Awareness event for WZA week. Due to changes in the Census UZA definition, staff created and presented a presentation on the changes to the Urban Boundary for the MPO area. Staff worked to develop a public facing data resource for freight data in Acadiana, based on the model developed by the DVRPC's Freight Finder tool (<a href="https://www.dvrpc.org/webmaps/phillyfreightfinder/">https://www.dvrpc.org/webmaps/phillyfreightfinder/</a>) but was not able to complete it at this time.

<u>Progress in Meeting Schedules:</u> The MPO did not hold two scheduled meetings in September 2022. Staff were not able to complete the public freight tool. All other tasks were completed as scheduled.

# PL-2 REGIONAL COORDINATION AND METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN

## **Established Goals:**

The purpose of this task is to utilize performance-based planning to research, develop and implement plans and programs that will benefit the future transportation needs of the Acadiana Metropolitan Study Area. Projected arterial, transit, pedestrian and intermodal transportation improvements are under this work task, planned and incorporated into the long-range build-out scenario for the area. The objective of this task is to employ data driven techniques to identify potential projects and programs that address the transportation needs of the Metropolitan Planning Area. This includes developing and implementing analytical methods to identify gaps in the connectivity of the transportation system and developing infrastructure and operational solutions that provide the public with access to services. This task also includes the development and management of the federally required performance measures. Performance measures must be developed and adopted on an annual basis and amended into the MTP.

## Actual Performance from 2023:

The MPO attended and participated in several regional meetings aimed at coordinating transportation initiatives, including the regional Chamber of Commerce and Lafayette Consolidated Government's Active Transportation committee. Staff worked with many local agencies to promote bike and pedestrian infrastructure and provide technical assistance for project development. These include attending LCG's bike committee meetings, working LSU-Ag Center's Healthy Living Coalition to develop bike and pedestrian projects, and working with the City of Sunset through the LDH Well-Ahead program. As part of this work, staff attended the Walkability Action Institute's training and the LSU-Ag Center TAP Rural project development seminar. Staff developed a Freight Parish Profile for each parish in the MPO region, utilizing IHS Transearch data and completed an overall report on freight infrastructure and flows in Acadiana.

<u>Progress in Meeting Schedules:</u> The MPO adopted the annual PM-1 target on schedule and adopted the updated PM-2 pavement and bridge targets and amended the MTP to reflect these changes. All other tasks are ongoing and completed in a timely manner.

## PL-3 TRAFFIC ANALYSIS AND CONGESTION MANAGEMENT

## **Established Goals:**

The purpose of this task was to monitor and evaluate environmental and other issues required to meet FAST guidelines. This includes the monitoring and evaluating of the Congestion Management Process along with other traffic analysis work required for project development and entity support during the transportation planning decision making process.

## Actual Performance from 2023:

The primary work product under this task for 2023 was the development of the updated Congestion Management Program for the MPO area. Staff utilized new technology such as probe data to analyze congested roadway segments and make recommendations to address the causes of traffic conditions. Staff were not able to complete this project in 2023 due to running out of funding for this task and aim to complete it in 2024. Staff also updated the transportation model with new roadway connections and provided assistance to DOTD and local public agencies by providing model runs on various local projects and studies.

<u>Progress in Meeting Schedules:</u> Staff were not able to complete the Congestion Management Program update for this fiscal year and will carry it over into next year. All other objectives under this task are either ongoing or completed in a timely manner.

## PL-4 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

## **Established goals:**

The purpose of this work is to facilitate the Project Selection Process through the STP>200K funding source and manage project delivery for STP>200k projects. In recent years, the MPO has adopted numerous policy guidelines for accelerating project delivery and moving funding from dormant projects into productive use. All tasks associated with developing and managing STP>200k projects are in this item.

## Actual Performance from 2023:

The MPO did not hold a project selection process in 2023. Staff primarily worked to keep all MPO projects on schedule throughout the DOTD process, including ensuring that project numbers were received, traffic engineering was completed, and design plans were on track. MPO staff met with all member entities to coordinate the project delivery process and ensure timely delivery and federal funding obligation of MPO STP>200K projects. Staff analyzed existing projects funded under the STP>200K program to shift funding to the new Carbon Reduction Program, based on project compliance with program requirements.

<u>Progress in Meeting Schedules:</u> Staff successfully adopted the new 2023-2026 TIP for the MPO area. All other tasks are ongoing and completed in a timely manner, including adoption of three amendments to the new TIP.

### PL-5 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

## **Established Goals:**

The purpose of this task was for the MPO to provide technical assistance to entities and within the organization itself. This includes traffic count collection, crash analysis, and GIS work.

## Actual Performance from 2023:

The major product for this task was analysis of the 2020 Census staff to support MPO planning efforts, including the development of a new Urban Boundary due to changes in the UZA for the Acadiana MPO area. This will be completed in fiscal year 2024. Staff working on this task also provided mapping assistance for the Congestion Management Program projects and integrated local roadway data from St. Landry Parish into the DOTD roadway data file and integrated land use data into transportation forecasts for the parish, which was completed as part of a project from the previous fiscal year. The MPO aided LCG with crash data analysis for roadway projects and operational improvements and analyzed bike and ped crash locations in the MPO for technical assistance purposes. Staff participated in a national MPO GIS committee and organized a webinar on the integration of GIS and PowerBI for Performance Management Monitoring.

<u>Progress in Meeting Schedules:</u> Staff will continue to work on the Urban Boundary changes for the MPO area. All other tasks were completed as scheduled.

A major project this year under this task included redesigning the monthly progress reports per guidance from DOTD and FWHA. Administrative support and management of MPO planning products was completed for this year, including regular submission of monthly progress reports and fund expenditure analysis to ensure compliance with DOTD contract requirements.

<u>Progress in Meeting Schedules:</u> The MPO successfully developed and adopted the 2023-2024 UPWP and redesigned the progress report format. All other tasks are ongoing and were completed in a timely manner.

The MPO staff was able to successfully project and manage the allocations for FY 2023 and stayed within 100% of the budgeted funding for the majority of the planning tasks for this year.
